The Bishop of Peterborough writes

Building fellowship through Holy Land pilgrimage

You may have seen that I am leading a diocesan pilgrimage to the Holy Land from 22 April to 1 May next year. Your clergy should have brochures, and more are available from my office. I am very much looking forward to this and hope to share those ten days with many of you.




Few experiences build fellowship or strengthen faith as much as visiting the Holy Land in the company of fellow Christians and in the context of worship.

Here Jesus Christ was born, lived almost all his life, exercised almost all his ministry, died and rose again. From here he ascended to heaven and sent out his disciples to build and lead his Church. We can see the places he knew and touched. We can sail on Galilee in a boat such as the ones he sailed in. We can walk the route he walked on the first Palm Sunday, we can sit in the Garden of Gethsemane, and we can follow that last walk as he carried his cross to Calvary.

I am always slightly uncomfortable with the phrase "Holy Land", but use it because people know what it means. The area of modern-day Israel and the Palestinian territories (which are partly occupied by Israel) is indeed a very special place, but it is also very troubled. "Holy Land" suggests a place at peace, a place where believers feel at home, a place of blessing. It is indeed a place where I and many others have found blessing and deep peace, but as you know it is also a place of tension and of fear, suspicion and enmity.

For various reasons the number of Christians living in the Holy Land has declined steeply in recent years. Archbishop Rowan among others has drawn attention to this, and called for greater understanding of and support for our brothers and sisters there. On our pilgrimage we will visit and support local Christians. We will have Christian tour guides, stay in Christian pilgrim houses and eat in Christian restaurants. This is not necessarily the cheapest way, but I believe it will enrich our experience and encourage those we meet.

The Friends of All Saints' Spring Outing

For the first outing of 2012 we did not stray far from home! Using shared cars our group met at Lyddington Bede House now run by English Heritage. The surviving building was a wing of a medieval rural palace of the Bishops of Lincoln. The estate included fishponds and a deer park. In 1600 this building became an almshouse for twelve poor men, two women and a warden. Homes for pensioners were provided here for over 300 years. You can see the bedesmen's rooms, which although small each had a window and a fireplace, and, on the first floor, the great chamber with a fine timber cornice to the ceiling.

The opportunity was also taken to visit Lyddington Parish Church. Such beauty and history so near to home!

From there we travelled the one and a half miles to St. Andrew's Church, Stoke Dry, where The Rev. Jane Baxter gave a talk on the many interesting aspects of the church dating back to Norman times. The ownership of Stoke Dry was at one time in the hand of the Digby family and the unfortunate connection of Sir Everard Digby with the Gunpowder Plot, had led to the unlikely suggestion that the plot was hatched in the small room above the north porch. Rumour aside we were able to see medieval paintings, Norman carvings, fine tombs, a 15th century screen and other interesting artefacts. An absolute treat was the music played by Jane and one of our group members on the 1810 Henry Lincoln organ, one of a few of this date left. It was restored (not brought up to date) in 1992.

The ladies of Stoke Dry (14 houses) provided us with an absolutely excellent homemade English afternoon tea in the church thus helping them with their fundraising and hence the preservation of this ancient and beautiful church.

The only thing that was not Spring like was the weather, heavy showers and a chill wind!

RUTLAND'S FIRST CHURCH TRAIL

On Friday 15th June Rutland's first NADFAS (National Association of Decorative and Fine Arts Society) sponsored Church Trail was launched by the research team of St Peter, Brooke helped by a local ODFAS member. (Oakham Decorative and Fine Arts Society) The team had worked hard over the last six months to research and design a series of questions and answers suitable for children aged between 6 and 12 years which would encourage them to become aware of and to enjoy and appreciate the church and its history.

At 2pm teachers and children from Brooke Hill Academy, Brooke Priory and Oakham Church of England schools arrived at Brooke church to be the first to complete the trail and soon the church was full with team members, parishioners, NADFAS and ODFAS representatives and friends. The High Sheriff of Rutland, Bart Hellyer also attended the launch.

The Revd Audrey Atkinson welcomed everyone saying that the church was for the community and not just for those who attend church, Mrs June Graveson, NADFAS trail advisor, spoke of the work of NADFAS and the purpose of church trails. The High Sheriff commented on Rutland's many fine churches and that an objective of his year of office was to encourage young people's interest and respect of our heritage so that it can be passed on to future generations.

Dr Peter Diplock, ODFAS chairman, talked of their work in the locality in promoting the appreciation of the arts especially to children and hoped that this first trail would encourage others in Rutland so that there would eventually be a 'trail of trails.' He then presented a CD of the Question and Answer script to the Revd Audrey Atkinson who suggested that the adults may now like to have a go at the trail before the refreshments.

The church buzzed with adults and children following the trail, discussing the questions and answers and learning new facts about Brooke church. Delicious refreshments then followed provided by the ladies of Brooke.

Question and answer sheets will be available in the church for anyone to use and information packs can be sent out to any schools interested in bringing a party of children along.

It is difficult to read because the individual letters are printed so differently and the spelling occasionally unusual. Nevertheless, we managed!

Afterwards, we enjoyed delicious food with strawberries and cream. Our thanks to all who made this such a delightful occasion.


