#### **Our Team Curate Dominic writes:**

Recently, on a trip cycling around Hambleton peninsular, I stopped to look around Egleton church. As I stood alone in this ancient place of worship, taking in its simple beauty, I remembered the slogan at the top of the Church of England website – 'a Christian presence in every community'. Thinking about the generations of people who had worshiped in that church, and the generations of clergy who have served that small community, I reflected upon the new place that I, since being ordained deacon on the 1st of July, have taken in service of this tradition. Then I went and had a very nice bacon sandwich in the village café.

As curate to the Oakham team ministry I have come, in part, to help the churches and people of this team to be that continuing Christian presence. But as well as coming to serve, I have also come to learn. Over the next three years I will be training in every aspect of parish ministry, ready to move into greater responsibility in other places in the future. So I must take this opportunity to thank all of you in the Oakham team, especially the other clergy, for everything that you will be giving to me during my time here.

I feel very fortunate to be undertaking this training amongst people committed to their churches and their communities. The work of the people I am getting to know at All Saints, the care clearly devoted to the village churches I visit, the enthusiasm of the volunteers at the recent holiday club; all of this gives me cause to be excited at the prospect of training amongst people who understand the importance of being a Christian presence in their communities. Not just in their own communities but also in each other's. The warmth of the people I met from many different places at a joyful team service at Langham, and the welcome I received from worshipers and choristers from around the villages at my

welcoming Evensong, showed their commitment to each other's churches in the team.

The Oakham team ministry exists so that the churches can support each other in being that Christian presence, in bringing the love of God to our communities. Already I have begun working on some of the cornerstones of the church's witness to God's love: baptisms and funerals. These markers of the beginning and the end of life, and the service we render the community in performing them, point towards the ultimate destiny of the Church. Although it may not always be easy to see it in the messiness and confusion of life (and life in the church) we look for the day when all of God's people are gathered into the eternal community of heaven.

In our own small way we anticipate this heavenly community when we join together for team services. So I look forward to meeting more of you on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of September at Braunston. I look forward to all the richness of experience that I will receive over the coming years.

#### The Bishop of Peterborough writes

Building fellowship through Holy Land pilgrimage

You may have seen that I am leading a diocesan pilgrimage to the Holy Land from 22 April to 1 May next year. Your clergy should have brochures, and more are available from my office. I am very much looking forward to this and hope to share those ten days with many of you.



Few experiences build fellowship or strengthen faith as much as visiting the Holy Land in the company of fellow Christians and in the context of worship.

Here Jesus Christ was born, lived almost all his life, exercised almost all his ministry, died and rose again. From here he ascended to heaven and sent out his disciples to build and lead his Church. We can see the places he knew and touched. We can sail on Galilee in a boat such as the ones he sailed in. We can walk the route he walked on the first Palm Sunday, we can sit in the Garden of Gethsemane, and we can follow that last walk as he carried his cross to Calvary.

I am always slightly uncomfortable with the phrase "Holy Land", but use it because people know what it means. The area of modern-day Israel and the Palestinian territories (which are partly occupied by Israel) is indeed a very special place, but it is also very troubled. "Holy Land" suggests a place at peace, a place where believers feel at home, a place of blessing. It is indeed a place where I and many others have found blessing and deep peace, but as you know it is also a place of tension and of fear, suspicion and enmity.

For various reasons the number of Christians living in the Holy Land has declined steeply in recent years. Archbishop Rowan among others has drawn attention to this, and called for greater understanding of and support for our brothers and sisters there. On our pilgrimage we will visit and support local Christians. We will have Christian tour guides, stay in Christian pilgrim houses and eat in Christian restaurants. This is not necessarily the cheapest way, but I believe it will enrich our experience and encourage those we meet.

Our June meeting was the annual outing held jointly with the Friends of Oakham Church, this year to Warwick, and a full report on this appears elsewhere. At her request he was raffled for MU funds and together with other craft items donated by our whole team of knitters and sold at Burley Road School fete, a further generous amount has been added to our charity appeal. We thank Joyce and all our knitters for their regular and valuable contributions and are also most grateful for the encouragement and support from Burley Road School.

It may not be generally known that a Wave of Prayer is carried out every day of the year as an act of thanksgiving and intercession for our members worldwide. This year Revd. Brian Nicholls kindly agreed to incorporate some of these prayers into our monthly Corporate Communion, recounting the many areas where MU is involved, both worldwide and in our own Diocese. In conducting for us a thoughtful and beautifully-paced Holy Communion Revd. Brian paid generous tribute to the care and commitment shown by MU members and stressed the importance of those building blocks of society, stable marriage and family life, and we thank him for his support and encouragement.

At our meeting on 12<sup>th</sup> July we were pleased to welcome Dr Charles Lawrence who spoke on Rutland Reminders. He gave an absorbing description of the work of this group whose aim is to offer therapy through singing and poetry to people with dementia, explaining how these activities can "re-mind" those – to use his moving phrase – "lost in dementia" and offering fellowship and support to their carers too. His informative presentation was accompanied by delightful pictures of

Rutland. There is an increasing recognition of the problem of dementia and so it was an uplifting, yet moving afternoon to be given an insight into this valuable work-, and we thank Charles very much for sharing his experiences with us. Once again thanks are due to Kevin Slingsby for his technical expertise with the power point presentation.

As I write our September meeting seems a long way ahead, but this will be held on **Thursday 13<sup>th</sup> September at 2.15pm in the Church Hall.**As we are making an appeal at the present time for more people to join us it seems a most happy arrangement that our meeting is dedicated to The Five Objects of the Mothers' Union, (and how many of us could rehearse those "off the top of our heads"?). We will be visited by Diocesan speaker Sheila Saunders to remind us about these and so we invite anyone considering joining us to come along and meet Sheila and learn more of our aims of objects. Which leads me nicely to ...

#### AN IMPORTANT APPEAL – HELP US GROW!!

as mothers and grandmothers have also witnessed the breakdown of so many marriages under the stress of modern society, and in many cases have shared the emotional distress, the financial burdens and the childcare involved.

We therefore make a heartfelt appeal to any member of the congregation who wishes to encourage our aim of support for marriage and family life (including loving support of those who marriages have failed) to consider joining MU and becoming actively involved in our varied and interesting programme. Our meeting on 13<sup>th</sup> September clarifying the five objects of the Mothers' Union seems a timely opportunity to find out more and **HELP US GROW!!**Barbara James

# The Venerable Gordon Steele, Archdeacon of Oakham, writes Going for gold

Over the summer, my family and I have been settling into the house in Peterborough that comes with my role as Archdeacon. It has been a much more pleasant task to move house in the summer than it might have been in the depths of winter when I actually began in post, and so I'm grateful that the house wasn't ready then. Moving house for us has also been far



less stressful than it is for many people because, as a clergy move, it hasn't involved the buying and selling of property, with all the attendant delays and uncertainties that can involve.

As I've been sorting out my study, my teenage children have been constantly watching the London Olympics, and their excitement and the exuberance of the commentators have occasionally caught my ear. My attention was drawn yesterday to the latest British triumph, two oarswomen who couldn't quite believe that they had won Olympic Gold and who certainly couldn't hold back the tears as the National Anthem was played.

By the time you read this, the Olympics will be over and the Paralympics will be well under way, or also behind us, and thoughts will be turning to Harvest.

For farming communities around the world, extreme weather conditions of droughts and storms have had a devastating effect this year, putting many livelihoods and lives in peril, and as we give thanks for the relative security of our food supplies, those so much more directly affected than us deserve our thoughts and prayers, and indeed our aid, rather than our complaints that the prices we have to pay are rising.

And, of course, the new beginnings in church life in September also focus upon the harvest theme in a spiritual way, namely the fields white for harvest and the need for the renewed enthusiasm of the labourers in the vineyard.

May the dedication of the internation-al athletes in London this summer, and the heroic efforts of all those who struggle against adversity to secure for us our daily sustenance, give us fresh inspiration to aim high, to Go for Gold, in our dedication to the service of the gospel in the months that lie ahead.



Friends Outing to Eastwood, Nottinghamshire.

D.H. Lawrence Heritage is a multi-award winning visitor attraction celebrating one of the greatest writers of the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. A group of Friends set out in mini-bus and car to explore and learn from the attractions based in two main centres, Durban House Heritage Centre and the D.H. Lawrence Birthplace Museum. It resulted in an interesting and great day for everyone.

This was the first time of using the VAR mini- bus and thanks go to Charles Robershaw for being our volunteer driver.

Lawrence's father was a miner in the busy coal mining community of Eastwood. Durban House was the offices for the major coal owners in the area, and where Lawrence would go to pick up his father's wages. Toady Durban House is a heritage centre in which Lawrence's life and experiences can be explored. It also houses The Rainbow Gallery, a temporary exhibition space, which when we were there was showing an excellent invitation photography exhibition including exhibits by Sir Paul Smith. Durban House Bistro gave us a comfortable and friendly venue for coffee, lunch and tea.

A short walk away, the D.H. Lawrence Birthplace Museum is, as its' name suggests the humble, working class house in which he was born. The guided tour of the house restored to look as it did in Victorian times when the Lawrence family lived there was full of information.

In his short life D.H. Lawrence produced a vast collection of work including novels, short stories, travel essays, plays, paintings and over 1000 poems. Despite travelling extensively during his lifetime he constantly drew inspiration from Eastwood, the mining community he grew up in. The town still retains the landscape and many of the buildings which inspired the author. To access this you can, as we did, follow THE BLUE LINE (Yes, a blue line on the pavement!) learning about and appreciating what was his.

Tony Harrod took many photographs during the day which I have mounted and put into All Saints' Church near The Friends stand should you like to get a flavour of our very enjoyable day out.

#### All Saints Friends and Mothers Union Visit to Warwick

Warwickshire's county town is world famous for its magnificent castle and historic charm. On Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> June the coach departed Oakham for a day in which we could explore some of the picturesque and interesting offerings other than the castle.

The Collegiate Church of St. Mary's is one of the most spectacular and largest Churches in England and given 5\*s by Simon Jenkins' England's 1,000 Best Churches. Founded in 1123 St. Mary's has been a worship place for over 1000 years and with its Tower being even taller than the towers at Warwick Castle can be viewed from many miles away. Our tour guides explained the illustrious history of one of the most important churches in all England. The Norman Crypt, a large vaulted space contains one of only two ducking stools in England. The Thomas Beauchamp Chapel built in the 15<sup>th</sup> Century holds the tomb of Richard Beauchamp, Earl of Warwick, one of the most powerful men in the history of England and is regarded as one of the masterpieces of medieval art. St. Mary's contains The Chapel of The Royal Warwickshire Regiment with Field Marshall Viscount Montgomery's garter banner hanging outside the chapel. The whole church was full of magnificent architecture reflecting rich and colourful local and national history. In the nave rebuilt in 1704 after the Great Fire of Warwick in 1694 was a superb art exhibition by pupils of Warwick Schools. The Musicians of King's High School gave a lunchtime concert of a high standard for us to enjoy. At the end of the day we joined the congregation for Choral Evensong. Thus we were able to share with the many visitors and local community the faith and ambience spanning the centuries of their busy working church set in the centre of an ancient town.

During the afternoon people were free to explore and enjoy the medieval buildings of the town, visit the County Records Office or Hill Close Gardens. (Rare survivals of Victorian gardens once used by townsfolk who lived above their business and wanted to escape from the crowded town centre.) The inclement weather was not inducive for boating on the Avon!

The Lord Leycester Hospital a unique, ancient and historic group of buildings continuously occupied for more than 600 years was once the home of Warwick's Medieval Guilds. From the reign of Queen Elizabeth1 to the present day it is a place of retirement for exservicemen and their wives. For centuries the Brethren's Kitchen provided good food and drink to the community of the Hospital. Today it refreshes visitors, as it did us, by providing a delicious afternoon tea.

Our thanks go to Gordon and Pamela Woods for organising this interesting visit to Warwick.

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
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
