

The Bishop of Peterborough writes

Ember Days

re you into Ember Days? They always Afall in threes: the Wednesday, Friday and Saturday of the same week. There is one Ember week in March, one in June, one in September, and one this month

The derivation of the word "Ember" varies according to who you ask, but its



meaning (either from Anglo-Saxon or from Latin) is "quarterly", four times a year. Hundreds of years ago these weeks were set aside by the Church, for gentle fasting and prayer. Gentle fasting means nothing between meals, and meat no more than once a day, so it isn't too arduous! But the idea was to have one week in each of the year's four seasons for slightly more focused prayer.

The Roman Catholic Church introduced the rule, which we have never had, that ordinations could only take place on an Ember day – though the Ember Day prayer focus in RC Churches these days is often something more general like world peace.

In the Church of England, although we don't restrict ordinations to Ember Days, the Ember Days became prayer for those in ordained ministry, and particularly for more people to hear God's call to consider ordination. Now that is something very specific which I like the sound of. We have seen more people answering that call in recent years, including more young adults which is wonderful. But those people are almost all men, and they are almost all looking for full-time paid ministry. I've no objection to that, but wouldn't it be good to see more women offering, and more for voluntary ("self-supporting") ministry as well? (The answer to that question is a definite Yes!)

So perhaps you will commit with me to pray on this month's Ember Days, 9,11 and 12 December, for God to call more young women and more self-supporting ministers into ordained ministry in this Diocese. Please do! Each time I write a letter for December magazines someone says "Why didn't you focus on Christmas?" The answer is that Christmas only occupies the last week of December: there's plenty else going on as well which shouldn't be forgotten. But just to complete the picture, and for after you have prayer your Ember prayers, do have a very joyful and peaceful celebration of our Lord's birth.

MOTHERS' UNION 12th November, 2015

We welcomed Jill Cannings to our November meeting. Jill has been a Street Pastor, operating in Corby, for the past three years, and came to speak about this work. She is on duty from 10 p.m. until 3 a.m., on the second Saturday of each month. The movement was set up by Les Isaac, who had lived on the streets himself, and he wanted to help prevent others from falling into the sort of experiences which he had had. His book on the subject is "Faith on the Streets". In our own area, the movement was begun by the sister of Debbie Marsh.

Street Pastors is a Successful Ministry. It helps to reduce the violence on the streets, associated with late night drinking. The Police wondered at first what these Christians were doing on the streets. As they go about, they essentially have a calming effect on the people they meet. 270 towns and cities across the country are covered by 1200 volunteer Street Pastors. They have a 12 week training. They wear a distinctive dark blue multi-layered uniform which includes thermals and waterproof trousers. Occasionally, if a Street Pastor meets an individual who is in a bad state, a layer of the uniform can be passed on. Lollipops are offered, as a point of engagement. The shouting often lessens, whilst these are consumed.

There are 3 or 4 Street Pastors in a team, and they operate in twos. Each team carries the all-important rucksack, which contains a first-aid kit, a radio, linked to CCTV, flip-flops for those who are walking unsteadily in high-heeled shoes, bottles of water, and a dustpan-and-brush, in order to sweep up the inevitable broken glass.


Jill gave us 4 reasons why she is a Street Pastor.

- 1. It is what Jesus would have done. He showed compassion to all on the streets.
- 2. It is a "Churches Together" ministry, trying to act as Christ's hands and feet, as part of the Body of Christ.
- 3. It is prayer based. A prayer group backs the Street Pastors when they are out. Sometimes the Pastors believe that they have been led to certain individuals. They step back from a violent situation, and pray, as Police move in.
 - Street Pastors do not evangelise. They simply want to see people get home safely, after a night out. People whom they encounter know that they are "something to do with God".
- 4. It is a "Doing" ministry. Street Pastors seek to demonstrate the gospel. Those on the streets late at night know that the Street Pastor is not judgemental. "God loves you", is a gentle reply to a rehearsal of a previous bad life. On one occasion, three Street Pastors took it in turns to listen

quietly and to pray for a young lady, already known to local Police, who was preparing to jump from a bridge. Before she was driven away by Police, she thanked the Street Pastors for their prayers.

Jill reminded us of the importance of donning "The armour of God", as described in Ephesians chapter 6, in order to be fit for the task.

She recalled the words of the founder of M.U., Mary Sumner, when she prayed daily that she would "touch lives for God", reminding us, in conclusion, that we are ALL Street Pastors.

St Peter's everyday business items were discussed and duly dealt with and the meeting moved on to organising our forth coming Christmas Coffee Morning, the Candlelight Carol Service and a possible fund raising event for next year.

The date of next PCC meeting was arranged for 23rd February 2016 at 6, Tay Close, Oakham and the APCM will be held on 29th March 2016 at Abbey Barn, Brooke.

A Fond Farewell.

At the end of November, Brooke says good bye to two well loved residents, Ian and Cath McKelvey, who have contributed so much to the life of the village. Both have served for years on the PCC, of which Cath was for a long while Secretary. We particularly associate them with the restoration of the bells in 1992. Cath took on the responsibility for the fund raising events, and what a spectacular success these were! Ian is still a bell ringer. Also he took a turn as Chairman of the Parish Meeting.

They are only going as far as Oadby, so we look forward to seeing them both from time to time. Meanwhile, we wish them every happiness in their new home.

The wedding of Jonathan Crosher, a veterinary surgeon of Oakham, and Sarah Gribble, a veterinary nurse took place at St Peters on Sat 31st October. Jonathan's grandparents, John and Pauline Jenkinson had lived in Brooke for many years and his mother Vicki had also been married at St Peter. A dismal day dawned for the wedding but

luckily the sunshine had broken through by lunchtime and continued to shine on the bride and groom and all their guests at the happy family event.

At a recent 8am communion service the Rev Brian Nicholls spoke to us about the re-naming of the Rutland Dispensary which is now called 'Rutland Grants'. The following article in the Stamford Mercury of 3rd November 1809 describes its original formation and aims almost a 150 years before the NHS was formed. Still in existence the charity now provides help with a wider range of medical expenses for the people of Rutland.

On the day of the jubilee the principal inhabitants of Gakham, with some friends from the neighbourhood, disco together at the George line at Gakham.

Col. Noel (alter dinner) proposed, that a Dispensity for the Poor of Oakham and Baileythorpe be established; and that it be supported by benefictions and annual subscriptions; and that it be named the Royal Jubilee Oldham Dispensary, in honor and in commemoration of the day. That it begin its beneficial purposes immediately.-The proposel was unachrously approved and a subscription-book is opened at Mr. Jones's, Apothecary, in the Market-place, Oakham. Dr. Donly and Mr. Jones have been so liberal already as to offer their gratuitous assistance, and will no doubt be followed by others of the medical profession, as the plan unfolds itself.-Col. Noel declared his intention, and the intention of his son (Mr. Charles Noel), to give each a benefaction of one hundred gumens, and each an annual subscription of five guineas: and he expressed his hopes that the establishment might, in time, be further extended, for more general parochial assistance for the sick poor throughout the county of Rutland. Messrs. Hill, bankers, Uppingnam, to be Treasurers to the Dispensary.

A quarter peal was rung at St Peter before evensong on 1st November 2015 in memory of Lionel Atton who died 17th October aged 88years; he was born in Braunston and had also been a bellringer. The team of

ringers was conducted by David Beadman, Lionel's godson, David's brother Richard and father John were also in the team along with Alan Ellis who as a youngster had been taught to ring by Lionel, Val Kellett and Louis Totaro completed the team.



EGLETON NEWS

St. Edmund's Parish people entered a festival mood, at the onset of St. Edmunds-tide; Edmunds Feast Day being November 20th. Canon Julie was pleased to have prime part in directing her first Patronal Festival Service, under the banner of St. Edmund King and Martyr!

The Saints' FLAG-a gift to Egleton from the Cathedral of St. Edmundsbury, following from their partnership in organising Festivals of all English EDMUND parishes -2001 & 2010 – flew vibrantly in the prevailing breezes, and prompted anticipation of this festival of praise and thankfulness for Edmund's exemplary pattern of Christian devotion.

Edmund was the Ninth Century King of East Anglia when his realm was invaded and ravaged by the plundering, pagan Vikings. In the end Edmund, faced with an ultimatum – to renounce his Christian allegiance or to die – rendered up his life; he was killed by a volley of arrows and swiftly acknowledged as a glorious martyr for Jesus the Christ. Many parishes, throughout the English nation - Cumbria to Isle of Wight, Devon to East Anglia – were inspired to name Edmund as their Patron Saint.

The South Porch of St. Edmund's Church was set aglow with a complementary display of photos and momentoes recording high lights of twin Festivals held in St. Edmundsbury. Several, widespread Parish Churches of England where as in Egleton Edmund's life and times are eternally cherished, were also on show in this eloquent gallery "Rejoicing in Edmund"!

In a grand finale to the Festival worship, the congregation rose to honour Edmund, the servant and saint of Jesus Christ, loyal to the uttermost. The chosen song of praise was "Egleton's Hymn to St. Edmund" which has become a traditional anthem of thankfulness and dedication through a good many, recent years.

"Edmund's sacrifice retold; love's obedience manifold, full' revealed by martyr's pains; with Saint's crown of thorns he gains honour for his Saviour, Lord; God the Father's law adored; faith's resources manifest; love's extent to us expressed."

And so to Advent and to the celebration of Our Saviour himself; hark! the herald angels sing "glory to the new born king....; born to raise the sons of earth; born to give them second birth!"

The time honoured Service of Lessons and Carols is to begin at 6.00 p.m. on Wednesday, Sixteenth of December. In keeping with recent excellent custom. Mince Pies and Drinks will bestow a further helping of the spirit of Christmas.

Christmas greetings are extended to all congregations in our Benefice: "we join with the angels and so there is given from earth HALLELUJAH, in answer to heaven; AMEN! be thou glorious, below and above; redeeming, victorious and infinite love".

During October The Friends of All Saints shared two events with a good number of people bringing much enjoyment and pleasure.

The Wandering Minstrels have been delighting audiences throughout East Anglia and the East Midlands for many years. We were pleased to welcome them back to All Saints to entertain with their beautifully sung and delightfully staged light-hearted excerpts from The Savoy Operas. A large audience enjoyed a congenial evening to remember.

Our annual celebration of All Saints Day (November 1st) saw us return for the 4th year to the delightful restaurant of The Harbour Bar at Whitwell with its wonderful views. David, the chef proprietor, looks after us so very well and menus and food presentation delight all present. Much chatter, many clean plates and happy faces are testament to the popularity of this event and venue.

Kirsty Wilby, the Marketing and Communications Manager spoke about one of our oldest charities which started in 1858, formerly known as The Wycliffe Society for Helping the Blind, now known as Vista. Vista is a leading local charity working with children and adults with sight loss in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland.
