

#### **Bishop of Peterborough writes**

#### My dear friends

As a boy I was taught that 21 March was The First Day of Spring, a day to be noted and celebrated.

Nobody told me why spring began then, and until I got into amateur astronomy in my teens that remained a mystery. When I learnt about the Spring Equinox, that 21 March was the day when sunrise and sunset were 12 hours apart, the hinge between winter and summer, it began to make sense.

Of course that day wasn't and isn't the first day of spring by any sensible reckoning; these days the Met Office defines spring as the months of March, April and May, which makes good sense. But 21 March has, since the earliest days of humans looking at the sky and thinking about the seasons, been a significant date in the calendar. Sadly, with industrialisation, the mass movement into towns and cities, and the proliferation of light pollution at night, most of us have stopped looking at the night sky. And, even though we are seeing more extreme weather, we continue to regulate our lives more by the clock than by the sun and moon and stars.

God has made, and placed us in, a wonderful world. And the seasons, caused by the tilt and movement of the earth relative to the sun, are key to much of the wonder. No seasons would mean no harvest. No autumn and winter would mean no pattern of slowing down and speeding up. No winter and summer would mean no alternation of hibernation or rest with vigorous full-on living.

These patterns and rhythms of life matter. They are part of how we were made, who we are. And they picture for us how God works in the world and in our lives. This spring look for the renewal of life which God gives to the world. Look for his renewal in your life. Ask him for green shoots, new hope, dreams of a brighter future.

May this hinge in the year be a hinge in our lives. May we move from sleep to wakefulness, from darkness into light. With best wishes


It is organised efficiently enough, so that about 80% of donations find their way to a place of need.

My challenge to any Christian is to point out that to deliver and collect envelopes during one week in May is a minor act of Christian witness to help desperate refugees.

Christian Aid Week this year is the 15th to 21st May.

# **LENT 2016 The Psalms Prayers for today's church**

An ecumenical course in five sessions written by Bishop Stephen Cottrell, comprising course booklet, CD and transcript; ideal for Lent, yet not Lent-specific.

The ancient poems we call Psalms are over 2000 years old. They were written

in very different times from our own when humans could travel at the speed of a camel - not at the speed of sound. But these songs have stood the test of time for they address many of the problems we still face: violence, injustice, anger - and bewilderment. Why do the wicked prosper? Where is God when we suffer? In this 5-session course, Bishop Stephen Cottrell - a prolific and popular author - reflects on the psalms in general (and five psalms in particular). He invites us to join him as he does so.

Session 1	Psalm 100	Know that the Lord is God
Session 2	Psalm 130	Out of the depths have I cried
Session 3	Psalm 13	How long, O Lord?
Session 4	Psalm 23	You spread a table before me

A groaning board of spiced foods, dried fruits with many breads, cheeses, fresh salads and cold meats, followed by mini-pancakes and coffee, allowed us to mark this turning point in the Christian year, and also to mark our friendship as a living community.

Ten tables of friends formed a natural development into "teams" as Gordon's famous quiz was being announced. Once the supper was cleared away, competition was high, especially as there were rumours that Gordon would again venture into questions of a biblical nature.

Quick glances around the room assured us that the Clergy were well distributed between the teams. Nonetheless it was clearly useful to have an expert with key knowledge nearby when answering crossword-style clues for "Books from the Bible", such as 1, 2, 3......? (answer: Numbers), or Sock A? (answer: Hosea) and "What is done by a beer maker? (answer: Hebrews)

The second quiz presented to us had about 25 pictures of well-known faces, or A-LIST celebrities of Rutland and beyond. However if the picture was of Jeremy Corbyn in his younger days, well, that was a bit of a challenge!

Gracious donations had been made of the tempting foods, pots of spring flowers, and the many wines for the raffle. Not the least of the

giving was in the personal time, skills and commitment it took to cook, arrange and organise this special evening. Friends we thank you.

The primary thanks of course must go to Beryl who, ably supported by David, organised us all, with Ronnie gently coaxing everyone to join in the raffle, quietly raising over £300 this year.

Well done to us all! We have now marked this turning point into Lent, as we start our personal journey towards Eastertide, supported by our own All Saints community.

#### **MOTHERS' UNION**

"Are all organs the same......or are some different?"

This is the way Kevin Slingsby started his "Musical Afternoon" to a full house of 25 at the last MU meeting. He explained that all organs are different, ranging from the very small home organ to the Atlantic City organ in the USA which has seven manuals and is being restored at the moment. The organ in All Saints Church Oakham has two manuals. Kevin showed several pictures on the screen of the various types of organ pipe, ranging from metal to wood, and demonstrated the many different sounds they make. This was given more detail by two short videos which showed "behind the scenes" of St Paul's Cathedral (five manuals), and Peterborough Cathedral. The organ here is gradually being retoned since it is slightly sharp. This is a long process involving the lengthening of all 5,286 pipes, with progress being reported on "Pipewatch".

Back to Oakham where the organ will celebrate 21 years, having been dedicated in November 1995, and with an opening recital in May 1996. This will be celebrated by a recital on Monday 26<sup>th</sup> September this year with a recital given by James Lancelot from Durham Cathedral. Kevin's interesting talk was thoroughly enjoyed by all. The next MU monthly meeting will be on Thursday March 10<sup>th</sup>. This will take place <u>in All Saints Church</u> commencing at 2.15 and will open with a service of Holy Communion celebrated by Canon Julie Hutchinson, followed by a talk by Julie. All are welcome.

#### Our Lent Charitable giving. WATER AID

As usual we are collecting to support the work of Water Aid and this year we have a specific target.

Providing clean water for communities overseas improves their health and their hygiene. It also reduces the drudgery of carrying water over long distances and greatly increases the chances of young children to obtain education. For many communities this is a life or death situation.

Water Aid calculates that the provision of a water outlet and a standpipe for a community costs as little as £20. Our target is to try and ensure that at least 10 communities can be provided with a standpipe through our "little red bucket" collections between now and Easter.

After the Second Sunday in Lent collection we had raised £75 so we are well up to target with three now certain and the fourth on its way. With your help we can make it at least 10 by Easter Sunday. The "bucket" will be in church for each service and if you want to contribute I am always happy to come and collect—ring 771564

#### **BROOKE NEWS**

This January St Peter was pleased to welcome some friends from other parishes when it hosted the fifth Sunday Benefice service taken by Canon Lee Francis-Dehquani. How good it is that Julie is now well again and once more able to take the services at Brooke. St Peter has also continued to welcome a steady stream of casual visitors throughout 2015, some who stop on their way walking the many footpaths around Brooke, others who come because of a particular connection or reason and others who just stumble upon the attractive church and little hamlet of Brooke and are pleased to find our church open. The visitor book continues to record visitors from all over the world and Peter Marriott our annual visitor from Australia was here again in January.

One hundred years ago on the 12<sup>th</sup> February 1916 the Grantham Journal sadly carried the following article concerning one of the young men commemorated in our church and later that same year on 12th May 1916 reported that the Oakham Volunteer Corps, a voluntary home defence militia, was on a training exercise around Brooke.

## BROOKE SOLDIER MISSING. Pte. JOSEPH ROYCE, 7th Northants.

Much anxiety is felt by the parents of Pte. Joseph Royce, of C Company, 7th Northants, Regiment, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Royce, of Brooke, Oakham, concerning the fate of their son. He has been officially reported as mirsing, and although many enquiries have been made, no trace of him can be found. Pte. Royce, who was 24 years of age, was engaged on his father's farm at Brooke up to the war, joining the 7th Northants, early in May, 1915. After training at Shoreham Camp and Woking Barracks, he proceeded to France with his Battalian carly in September, and took part in the Battle of Loos, commencing about the 25th of that month. He has been posted as missing, and any news of him sent to Mrs. Royce, Brooke, Oakham, would be welcomed.

OAKHAM VOLUNTEER CORPS.

Purther practical week was undertaken by the Outhon Volunteers on Sunday, when there was a march out to the Leigh Forest district, where output remesses were undertaken, extending through the morning and afternoon. The unsettled character of the weather probably accounted for the turnous not being so good as usual, but though rain threatened the greater part of the day, it held off, with the exception of a slight fall in the afternoon. The Company, under Commandant P. C. Nichola, left the Drill Hall shortly before-deven o'clock, and proceeded in column of route to Brooke Priory, where they divided into two metions, to take up a line of outpots along the breek in the valley below Ridlington. The "enemy" was represented by the Commandant and two man, who advanced over the hill from the direction of Bolton. After lunch, there was a spall of outpot and sentry duty along the west side of Prior's Coppice. Oakham was reached about five-o'clock, after a pretty hard but directeding day's exercise.


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#### **EGLETON NEWS**


Feast Weekend with Street Fair and dog show – June 26<sup>th</sup>
