November: all the harvest festivals are over, Halloween too, and the October half-term break; the clocks have gone back, and we are into deep autumn. Cold, windy, raining, darkness encroaching on the day from both ends. The golden browns turning into leaf mulch on the grass and the pavements.

November: a month of remembering, connecting with our past and our origins. All Saints, Armistice: martyrdom, blood, war, war, and more war. It is important to remember, and to gain

encouragement from the faithful of past generations. And Advent, with its promise of new light and new life, is on the horizon for the end of the month.

But, important as these things are, we mustn't spend too much time looking back, or even looking forward. There was no golden age back then, and there will be none while this world endures. Faith in Action with Mothers' Union

In 1876 Mary Sumner saw the need to develop support for married women in their family life. From that starting point Mothers' Union grew so that by 2016 there are branches in 83 countries and a membership over 4 million. In Peterborough Diocese we have just under 1000 members and 48 branches.

There is only one requirement for membership of the Mothers' Union in the United Kingdom if you decide you would like to support the objectives it pursues. That is that you have been baptised in the name of the Trinity.

Like all branches Oakham meets regularly. Yes you say but what do they do?

Good question and all branches strive to be **Faith in action**.

St James tells us:

“ if faith does not lead to action it is,
in itself, a lifeless thing”

What Mothers' Union seeks to do is summed up in the mission it has and the objectives through which it pursues that mission. I quote from its constitution:

Mission: As a Christian organisation “to promote the well being of families worldwide

Objectives: To uphold Christ's teaching on the nature of marriage and to promote its wider understanding

To encourage parents to bring up their children in the faith and life of the church

To maintain a worldwide fellowship of Christians united in prayer, worship and service

To promote conditions in society favourable to stable family life and the protection of children

To help those whose family life has met with adversity”

Yes but what do they do that achieves these objectives?

They raise a lot of money but that is only the oil that fuels the efforts- Grapevine, the magazine of Peterborough Diocese together with Families First and Families Worldwide will tell you. These may well be around the church or you can speak to any M.U. member. Some Examples are:

- We run worldwide literacy, numeracy and parenting programmes
- We provide holidays for families who have rarely or never enjoyed them
- We are running a lunch club in Kettering which is young but now beginning to show signs of real growth.
- For some of our hospitals we provide basic essentials boxes for those who enter hospital without them.
- We have a very powerful prayer chain
- We support the Central Organisation in its work across the world.

All these activities and many more which get on with it, perhaps too quietly, make a real impact in our world but action needs people as well as faith. Can you really see anything in Mothers' Union objectives that you don't think worthy of support ?

As St James has said, reminding us of Abraham-
“Surely you can see that Faith was at work in his actions and that, by his actions his faith was fully proved”

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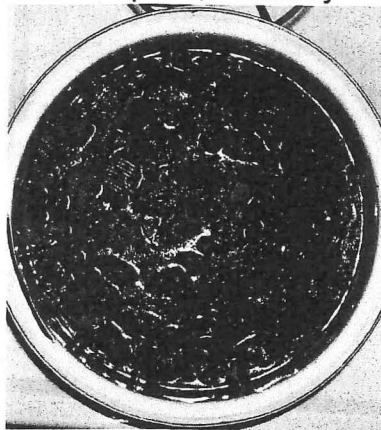


Second 'junk food' café open in Northampton

St David's Community Café has become the second in Northampton to be part of 'The Real Junk Food Project'.

The Kingsthorpe café is located in St David's Church Hall, and has been open since June 2015 as a not for profit, voluntary run community project. They have signed an agreement with FareShare that allows it to reclaim unwanted food from Tesco.

The Reverend Rachel Hetherington, vicar of St David's and speaking on behalf of The Community Café said "This is an exciting development for the café because it will enable us to provide good quality meals from



food that would have otherwise been sent to landfill. Under the agreement we cannot sell donated food so customers are encouraged to 'pay as you feel' donating what they think the food is worth either in money or by volunteering".

Ashley Cooper from FareShare said "As you would expect Tesco would like to sell all of their stock. However, there are lots of different reasons why there is often good quality food left over at the end of the day. We have teamed up with Tesco to link stores with charities and community groups, giving them access to this unsold food that would otherwise go to waste, for free."

This is the second café in Northampton that seeks to tackle the huge problem of food waste. Elsie's Café in Charles Street has been pioneering The Real Junk Food Project's 'pay as you feel'

policy to highlight movement toward a less wasteful lifestyle.

Shena Cooper from Elsie's said "It is great to have another café opening. We rescue edible food from shops, restaurants, warehouses and well known Supermarkets, Morrisons, Waitrose and Ocado. Now we can share when we collect food in bulk. One day we had 85 lettuce, another day 1200 eggs, and another 40kg Clover spread. We are only rescuing a tiny fraction of what goes to waste but as the project grows in Northampton we will start to make a real difference. We say #feedbelliesnotbins."

The Community Café is open Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 10am to 1.30pm and serves coffee and cakes, breakfast and lunch. It is located in St David's Church Hall, Eastern Avenue, NN2 7QB.

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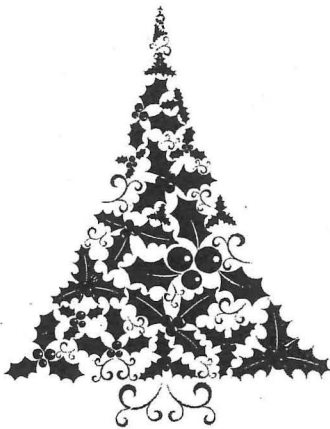

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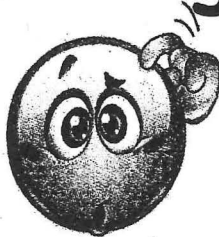

☪ BROOKE NEWS

The family of Peter Jones attended St Peter on 6th August for the interment of his ashes; Peter was born at Brooke where his parents were farmers for many years as he himself was too. On 23rd August Mary showed a party from Launde Abbey around St Peter who were studying church architecture.

A happy and joyful Harvest Festival service took place at St Peter on 18th September and the collection, amounting to £167, will be donated to Water Aid. The church, as usual was a riot of colour due to the beautiful floral displays artistically arranged by Brooke's ladies. A full congregation enjoyed tasty refreshments and drinks after the service and thanks go to all who provided them and arranged the flowers.

Our Harvest service reminds me of a special service held at Brooke on Thursday 4th September 1879 to celebrate the official re-opening of St Peter after major restoration work begun in the spring of 1878.

The work was carried out under the direction of the Rt Hon Gerard Noel MP of Catmose House, now the Council Offices, his wife Lady Augusta Mary Lowther masterminded the fund raising and donations and Mr G F Finch MP of Burley on the Hill was the patron of the fund. Mr Ewan Christian, a highly respected and successful Victorian architect was employed for the chancel work and Mr James Tait, architect and partner with Langton and Herbert of Greyfriars, Leicester was employed for work to the rest of the church. The actual building work was carried out by the firm of John Jones Fast Esq of Melton Mowbray, a building contractor of some note and responsible for the restoration of many churches; in 1871 he was recorded as employing 185 men and 12 boys.

From autumn 1876 to 1879 the local papers reported the many fund raising amateur concerts and various church collections going towards

St Peter's restoration fund and by March 1878 more than £892 had been raised towards the £1000 required. Concerts were held in the Agricultural Hall, now called the Poultry Hall at the museum, floral decorations for the Poultry Hall were provided by the Earl of Lonsdale of Barleythorpe Hall and after show parties were held at Catmose House just across the road from the museum at the home of Gerard Noel MP and his wife Lady Augusta. The audiences included many of the titled and wealthy of the area with a number of them performing in the concerts as well.

Next month more to follow on the re-opening service and gifts presented to the church.

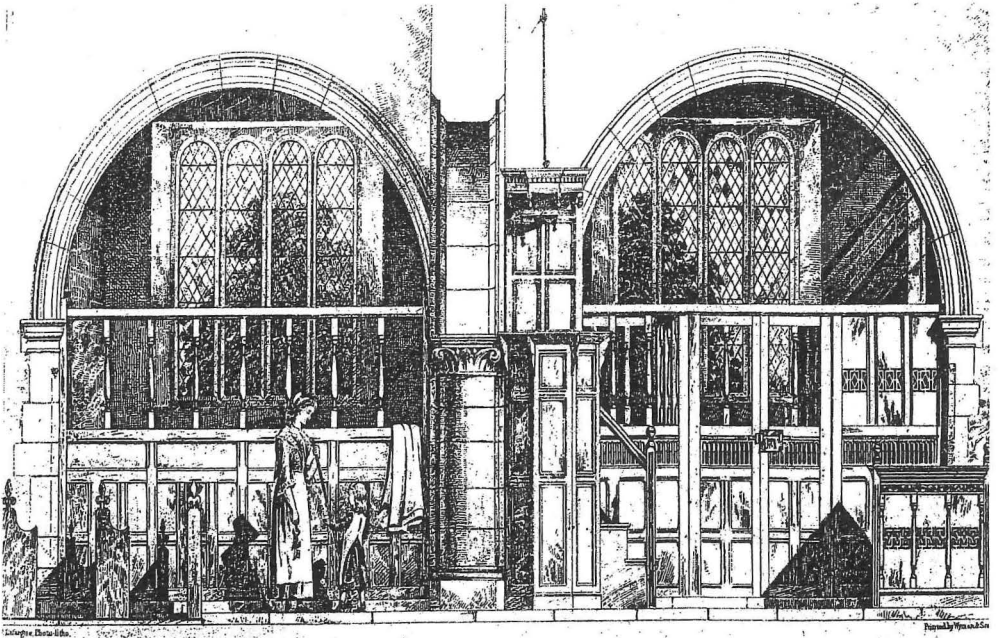

There was a large and appreciative audience, amongst whom were Lord Gainsborough, Mr. Gerard Noel and Lady Sybil Lowther, Mr. and Mrs. Fane, Mr. G. H. Finch and the Misses Finch, Mr. and Mrs. Wingfield, of Tickencote Hall, the Countess of Harborough and Major Clagget, Mr. and Mrs. Dawson and party from Launde Abbey, Mrs. Palmer and party from Withcote Hall, Mr. Charles Frewin and the Misses Martin, the Hon. and Rev. Canon Stuart and the Misses Stuart, Mr. and the Hon. Mrs. Forester and party, Mr. and Mrs. Clifford Chaplin, of Burrow Hill, the Vicar of Oakham and Mrs. Mould. About £30 was realised. After the concert Mr. Noel and Lady Augusta Noel gave a large garden party at Catmose.

A saint and a martyr like Edmund, 9th century King of East Anglia, deserves no less! His heroic though fateful exploits in defending his kingdom against the horrific ravages of Viking invaders, all in the name of Christ, his Lord and Saviour, constitute a martyrdom of sublime devotion.

"In next to no time" Edmund's majestic example was honoured by scores of parishes throughout England and beyond, so astutely as to declare him their Patron Saint. He remains one to love and to cherish, both in Egleton and far beyond our parish bounds !

This festival season provides a grateful reason to report the recent retirement of the Very Revd James Atwell, Dean of Winchester and formerly Dean of SAINT EDMUNDSBURY. He was an esteemed , pioneering partner with Egleton in promoting the splendid festival of EDMUND PARISHES 2001 in St Edmundsbury; so successful as to be renewed in 2010 - by which time Dean James had been translated to Winchester

James remains highly thankful for our partnership and friendship, before and after our rewarding Festivals which brought together over thirty "Edmund Parishes in England" - to the immense profit and appreciation of all those five hundred pilgrims "REJOICING IN EDMUND " .

James- memorably described by his admiring Bishop of St Edmundsbury as "our lovely Dean"- is eager to extend cordial greetings to all his Egleton friends . Nowadays, he is happily at home in Cambridge, sampling his well merited retirement- from a highly distinguished and genial ministry : in Egleton St Edmund's we share every prevailing good reason to appreciate Dean James and to wish him joys a-plenty !

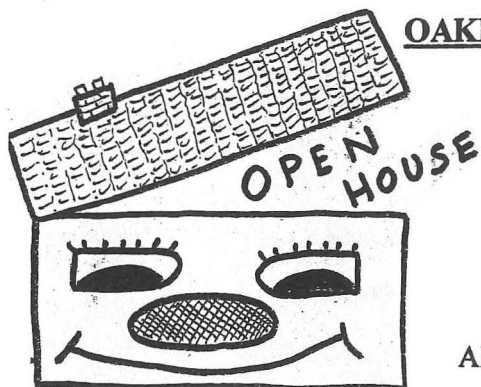

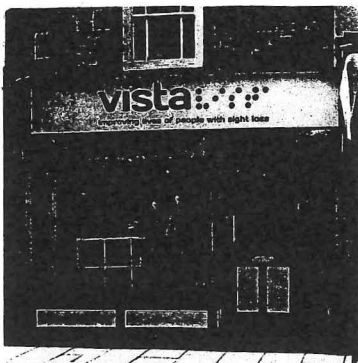

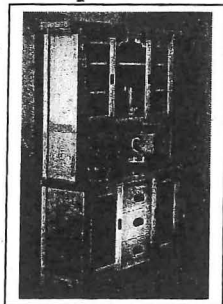
