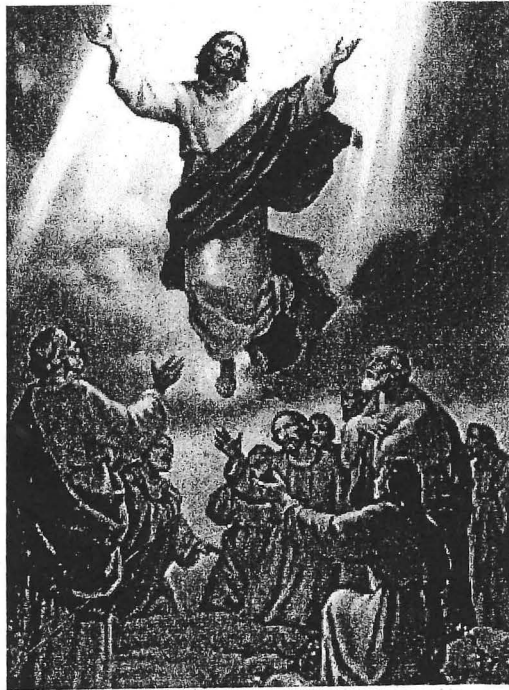

Gail Rudge writes:

Dear Friends

Isn't spring the most amazing time? Maybe because Easter was nearly as late as it could be, the season has seemed to just last and last. Beginning almost imperceptibly, we've enjoyed waves of different flowers, such a display of beauty bringing hope and newness of life after the cold and damp of winter. But, as this season draws to a close, it isn't the end. There's more to look forward to. We've enjoyed new beginnings, seen new life, not only in the plants but in the fields and trees around us; there are lambs in the fields, birds singing, our swallows have returned to nest in the church porch – don't mention the bats! There's a promise of so much more to come.

Walking round the garden enjoying all this made me think about the disciples and Jesus' family and friends. Their fear and total despair for the future had been transformed into joy beyond their expectations. Not only had their Lord risen from the dead, not only had he appeared to them that first day, but he kept on appearing. We don't have many details about these appearances; we know that very soon after he'd risen the disciples enjoyed a BBQ breakfast with him in Galilee. What a turmoil of emotions must have hit Peter when he saw Jesus standing on the shore and ran out of the water to meet him. Then that walk alone together; having to face up to his denials; be challenged about his love; then being reinstated.

We know Jesus spent 40 days teaching; explaining; fitting together the missing pieces of the jigsaw; making everything clear at last. Paul tells us of one occasion when Jesus appeared to over 500 of the brothers at the same time. What a gathering and let's not forget the women who would surely have been part of all this, those who had followed, supported and cared for him during his ministry, stood at the foot of the cross, those to whom he first appeared, and his family.

What a time it must have been; a time of joy and hope but also, as Jesus kept appearing and teaching them, a time of growing expectation of

more. A growing understanding that their role would be to tell the world about him. A growing confidence in the promises that Jesus had made that he would be with them through his Spirit.

'Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about. For John baptised with water, but in a few days you will be baptised with the Holy Spirit'.

Then he was gone; he blessed them, then ascended into heaven before their very eyes. If they had needed any further confirmation of who he was they had it!

During Lent we've had not only the opportunity to reflect on Jesus' journey, from the temptations in the desert to his final journey to the cross, but to take the time to reflect on our own spiritual journey. Now, after the rejoicing of Easter, can we feel a rising expectation of more to come in our relationship with God? Maybe an increased awareness of his presence in our lives; maybe hints - challenges - of how we could serve him, where our journey with him will take us?

Whatever happens I pray that all of us may share in the hope and rising expectation of how God will reveal his presence and his will to us and, as we approach Pentecost, our hearts will be open to the presence and power of the Holy Spirit both in our individual lives and in our lives together.

Christian Aid Week: 14th to 20th May

So many people have amazing stories of Christian Aid week here is one story of Theodor Davidovic .

Theodor is 91 now and a dedicated Christian Aid week volunteer. Orphaned aged eight he was a teenager during the Second World War and fought in the resistance movement in Serbia against Germany. But in the political chaos after the end of the war he had to flee his country.

He lived in refugee camps in Europe for two and a half years and says he owes his life to organisations like Christian Aid.

“It was the Christians who sent the parcels then just as they do now. It was the big organisations that were feeding us and I never forgot it. That is why I volunteer for Christian Aid.

The people then who were contributing through Christian Aid Week helped me to survive. I feel I owe my life to the cause. To Christian Aid I promise that I will do my best as long as I live and I am still doing it”

Thank you all for everything you do for Christian Aid Week. You have demonstrated that you won't stand by whilst our neighbours are suffering, that you share Jesus' outrage over injustice and you are prepared to do something about it.

It means so much to people like Theodor.

Mothers' Union April Meeting

The title of Robin Robson's talk was "The Life of a Reader". This role goes back a long way in the Church of England. In 1561, it was established under Archbishop Parker. Candidates were invited who were, "no brawlers, not drunkenly, or jesters, but of good morals, submissive, with benevolent intentions, those who would speak plainly and audibly." The Readers were appointed to minister to the poorer parishes. They were allowed to bury parishoners, but not to administer the Sacraments. However, as Robin put it "they fizzled out". In 1866, the office was reinstated, meaning that last year, the Church could celebrate 150 years of service, by the Readers. In 1969, women were admitted as Readers. (Currently, one is not aware of any further "fizzling out") Readers are described as the workers, rather than the master builders. They made a valuable contribution to Church life during the two World Wars, when they stepped into the breach left when Chaplains went to minister to the armed forces.

Holding her blue Reader's scarf, Robin said that it showed a division between the Clergy and the Laity, but again, the two ends of a scarf will essentially also, create a link. Robin had wanted to "do something in the Church". She and her family attended a small but lively Church in Wiltshire. Eight people went forward to be lay Readers, at the Vicar's suggestion. They underwent Reader Training, which included learning to meditate, and involved lots of essay writing. The goal of all this was "The advancement of Christ's Kingdom"

By 2002, Robin's three children had moved to the east of England, and she and her husband came to Bisbrooke. Canon Julie Hutchinson was then Vicar of the Lyddington group of Churches, and was replaced by Reverend Jane Baxter, when she went to serve in Peterborough. Besides preaching at Church services, Robin would take Communion to the housebound, and visit the sick. She was also appointed Bishop's Assessor, interviewing candidates coming forward for Readership. After interviewing, Robin would write a report. She also

interviews those Clergy having their "Annual Review", in their parishes. There are two authorised "Listeners", for people in the Diocese, and Robin was one of those, for two years. These are demanding and time consuming roles to which Robin has brought much enthusiasm and insight. She told us that she loves being part of the Ministry Team in Oakham.

Currently Robin is attending a two year course at Launde Abbey entitled "Holy Listening". We wish her very well, in this next part of her ministry.

Next meeting will be on Thurs 11th of May at 2.15pm in All Saints Church.

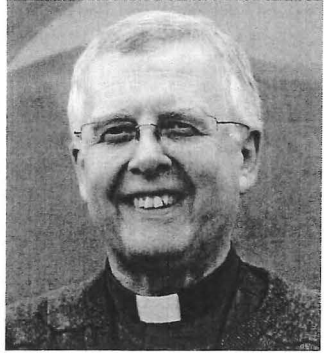
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He is (still) risen

This year the whole of May falls within the great 50-day Easter season. The revival of that whole period between Easter and Pentecost as a celebration of Christ's resurrection is one of the best features of the modern church calendars. It is not just on Easter Day that we can shout, "He is risen indeed. Hallelujah!" Of course every Sunday is (and should be) Resurrection Day. Jesus' rising from the dead is why we worship together on Sunday. It is the first day of the week, the



Day of Resurrection. Every Sunday. But we forget, and we let other things crowd out the empty tomb, the risen body, the promise of new life for us all.

I suspect that if we lived out our faith in the context of persecution, if we regularly saw or heard of our fellow believers taken away to torture or death, we might focus more naturally on the resurrection as the key to everything, we might know the reason for meeting together on Sundays. But we have become soft, we have become used to relatively comfortable long life. We have forgotten that this life is short and very precarious, we have lost sight of the priority of being ready each day for death. We have lost sight for the need to live each day in the knowledge of Christ's resurrection, and the anticipation of our own.

During this long and glorious Easter season, may we all re-focus on the reality of Jesus Christ's bodily resurrection as a historical fact; and may we remind ourselves and one another of our new life in Christ, which has already begun, and which will be completed and perfected at the glorious final resurrection. Living each day in the light of that should change our priorities, our focus, everything. May we be resurrection people, Easter people: not just in this Easter season, but right through the year. He is risen indeed. Hallelujah!

St Peter's Day - Holy Communion at 7pm on 29th June followed by drinks, strawberries and cream.

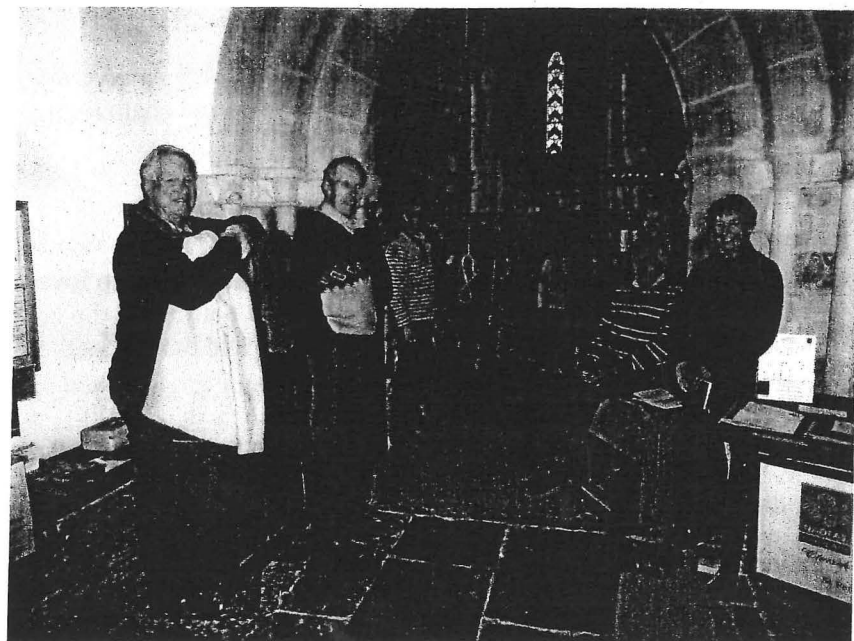
Sunday 2nd July at 3pm, summer teas and a small concert organised by Terry's granddaughter and friends.

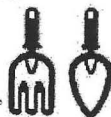

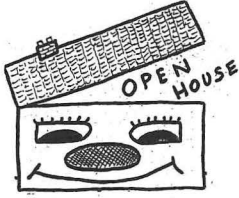

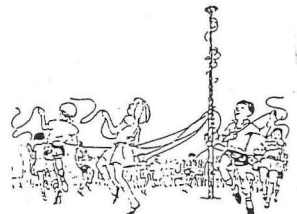
