Marks of Mission

What is mission? The word is used to cover so many aspects of church life, in fact almost everything we do, that it can become almost meaningless. That is why I sometimes prefer the word Growth, which at least we can see and measure. So in this diocese we encourage parishes to have Growth Action Plans, rather than the more vague Mission Action Plans that are seen in some other places.

However, we must not lose the word Mission, which is vital for our living faith. So what does it mean? The Anglican Communion (the C of E and its sister churches round the world) has come up with the *Five Marks of Mission*, which I think is a very good way to focus our minds. These are

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
- To respond to human need by loving service
- To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth

(Some people abbreviate these into Tell, Teach, Tend, Transform and Treasure. That doesn't do a lot for me, but if it helps you, use it!)

Taken together, and in their right order, these are a good summary of our calling as God's Church. Sadly, sometimes people just focus on one or two of the five, thereby losing the point that mission should cover all of life. The Anglican Communion website, in introducing the Five Marks, makes the point that the first mark, proclaiming the Good News of the Kingdom, is talking about personal evangelism, and "instead of being just one, albeit the first, of five distinct activities, this should be the key statement about everything we do in mission." Similarly, former Archbishop Rowan Williams wrote that if we work towards any of the third, fourth, and fifth marks without doing the first and second, we are not doing Christian mission. In other words, the first two marks are at the very heart of what we should be doing; the last three are important once we are doing the first two. I am asking our new Mission and Development Team, based at Bouverie Court, to help us all attend to the five marks, beginning with the first. Watch this space!

A new Dean has been appointed to Peterborough Cathedral

The Queen has approved the appointment of Canon Tim Sledge as Dean of Peterborough. Canon Sledge is Vicar of Romsey in the of Winchester, a post he has held since 2008. that he spent five years as Mission Enabler in Diocese of Peterborough. As Vicar of Canon Sledge is responsible for Romsey which was originally founded as a

Benedictine nunnery in 1000 AD and is the largest parish church in Hampshire. Under his leadership the Abbey has succeeded in reversing a substantial annual deficit and growing both its congregation and its visitor numbers.

Tim, who trained as a musician, has contributed to several books on mission, in particular on faith and worship amongst young people. He chairs the Church of England's Young Vocations Strategy Group and is part of the nationally recognised Leading Your Church Into Growth team and young people.

During his time at Romsey Abbey, Canon Sledge led a seven year development plan. This focused on growing the church's work with young families and on discipleship, spirituality, community work and the creative use of buildings and heritage. He also worked with the local authority and other partners in Romsey to set up a consortium to promote the town as a visitor destination. This has resulted in a 15% increase in visitor numbers.

Tim has established a link between the Abbey and the Anglican Province of Burundi and has made several visits there with members of the congregation. He is Chaplain to the Mayors of Romsey and Test Valley, and to the Scouts and the Royal British Legion. He is also a co-founder of Triangulate, a local mental health charity, and Romsey Abbey is currently the only parish church in the country to be Mindful Employer.

The new Dean joins Peterborough Cathedral at an exciting time as it approaches the celebration of its 900th anniversary in 2018 and emerges from a period of cash flow difficulties with a robust business plan in place.

Canon Sledge said: "It is a great privilege to be invited to take up this role and I am very much looking forward to leading Peterborough Cathedral into a new phase of its life. For too long the Cathedral has been in the news because of its

financial problems and this has obscured the good work it has done, and continues to do, in ministering to the wider community. I shall be working with the Chapter and staff to help the Cathedral meet its financial targets and doing all I can to ensure that the Cathedral becomes a good news story, in every sense, for the city and the diocese."

The Rt Revd Donald Allister, Bishop of Peterborough, said:

"I am delighted at Tim Sledge's appointment as Dean of Peterborough. He holds the values and traditions of Cathedral life and worship, while at the same time having a passion for mission and for leading people to faith in Jesus Christ. "His time at Romsey Abbey, and before that in this diocese, have shown his faithfulness to our core beliefs and values, and his effectiveness in mission. I am very much looking forward to welcoming him, and to working with him."

The Rt Revd Tim Dakin, Bishop of Winchester, added:

"Tim's contribution to Romsey and the wider community here has been exceptional. Under his wise and good-humoured leadership the Abbey has grown from strength to strength, developing its mission with passion, confidence and friendship. We will all be very sorry to see Tim go, and I know he will be especially missed by the community at Romsey. But I am filled with hope and encouragement for the future of Peterborough Cathedral, which I am sure will thrive with the help of Tim's judicious and prayerful stewardship. I wish Tim every success on his return to Peterborough, and I want to thank him on behalf of the whole Diocese of Winchester for everything he has done during his nine fruitful years with us."

The Revd Canon Jonathan Baker, Acting Dean of Peterborough, said: "I welcome the news that Tim Sledge is to be the next Dean of Peterborough. Tim's experience and clear focus on mission are exactly what the Cathedral community needs at this time and I am looking forward to our ministry developing with confidence and vigour with his leadership."

Canon Sledge succeeds the Very Revd Charles Taylor who retired in October 2016. His installation service will be held at 3.30pm on Sunday 15 October 2017.

A Dove Cottage Day Hospice has recently opened not far from Brooke at Jubilee Farm on the Ridlington Road and a friend whose late partner had benefitted from their care and friendship during his visits there took me along to their Open Afternoon on Sat 8th July.

There was a delicious afternoon tea provided of sandwiches, cakes, strawberries and cream along with a refreshing glass of Pimms, Morris Dancers entertained us throughout the afternoon and all this with beautiful scenic views across the valley towards Ridlington.

It struck me that there were not many Oakham faces amongst the visitors and I wondered if its presence was not well known of in this area. A registered charity, Dove Cottage's services are free of charge; guests can spend a day in a safe environment, with nursing care, activities, complementary therapies, chaplaincy support, home cooked lunches and snacks and benefit from meeting and talking to people in a similar situation to their own as well as providing carers with support and a break from their responsibilities.
