First Reading – Genesis 1.1-5*

In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, 'Let there be light'; and there was light. And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the

darkness. God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

Second Reading – Acts 19.1-7

While Apollos was in Corinth, Paul passed through the inland regions and came to Ephesus, where he found some disciples. He said to them, 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you became believers?' They replied, 'No, we have not even heard that there is a Holy Spirit.' Then he said, 'Into what then were you baptized?' They answered, 'Into John's baptism.' Paul said, 'John baptized with the baptism of repentance, telling the people to believe in the one who was to come after him, that is, in Jesus.' On hearing this, they were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus. When Paul had laid his hands on them, the Holy Spirit came upon them, and they spoke in tongues and prophesied – altogether there were about twelve of them.

Gospel – Mark 1.4-11

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, 'The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.' In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

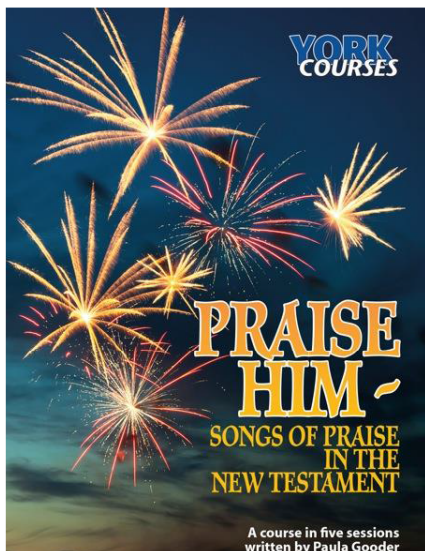

Praise Him – Songs of praise in the New Testament



We are used to singing hymns of praise when we go to church but often we miss the hymns and poems that are there in the New Testament. This course will explore five different Songs of Praise from the New Testament, looking at what they tell us about God and Jesus but also reflecting on what they tell us about us and our faith.

An ecumenical course in five sessions written by Dr Paula Gooder ideal for Lent, yet not Lent-specific.

1. Gratitude (Ephesians 1.3-14)
2. Image of God (Colossians 1.15-20)
3. Humility (Philippians 2.5-11)
4. New birth (1 Peter 1.3-12)
5. Word made flesh (John 1.1-14)

The course booklet, written and introduced by New Testament scholar [Dr Paula Gooder](#) includes a good selection of questions at the end of each of the five sessions, designed to stimulate wide-ranging discussion.

The participants on the course CD are [Archbishop Justin Welby](#), [Sister Wendy Beckett](#) and actor [David Suchet CBE](#).

Methodist [Moira Sleight](#) provides the Closing Reflection at the end of each session.

Dr Paula Gooder is Theologian-in-residence for the Bible Society. She is Canon Theologian of Birmingham and Guildford Cathedrals, Lay Canon at Salisbury Cathedral, a Six preacher of Canterbury Cathedral, Vice president of the Bible Society, Visiting lecturer at King's College, London, and Associate lecturer at St Mellitus College, London. She is a Reader in the Church of England and a member of General Synod.



The Most Reverend Justin Welby was educated at Eton College and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he studied history and law. He subsequently took a theology degree at St John's College, Durham, in which he focused on ethics – particularly in business and has since published articles on ethics, international finance and reconciliation. He was enthroned as the 105th Archbishop of Canterbury in 2013.

Sister Wendy became a nun at the age of 16, graduated from St Anne's College, Oxford with highest honours, went on to live for nearly 20 years as a hermit, and then was exposed to the world in a successful television career as the 'art nun'. She is the author of over 20 books with art as the main theme. She continues to live a cloistered life, devoted to prayer.



David Suchet CBE is an Associate Artist and Governor of the Royal Shakespeare Company, and a multi-award winning actor. He has featured in many documentaries, including *In The Footsteps of St Paul* and *Being Poirot*. A Vice President of the Bible Society, David has made a 80-hour-long audio recording of the entire NIV Bible for Hodder Faith.

Moira Sleight is Editor and Publisher of the Methodist Recorder weekly national newspaper. She is a Board member of the Society of Editors and also of the London Press Club.

Around the diocese

Permission to change

Four speakers with one message amplified in four different ways: if you want to grow, you have to change, for growth is change.

That was the theme of the triennial diocesan ministers' conference in November, where 180 clergy and 120 licensed lay ministers gathered for four days at The Hayes Conference Centre in Derbyshire.



"I don't believe God wants us just to exist, he wants us to be fully alive," declared Robert Atwell, the Bishop of Exeter, adding "we should not be about the love of power [in our churches] but about the power of love."

Bishop Donald concurred. "We're to become the people others want to join," he said, and pointed out the growth of other denominations compared to the stagnation or even decline of parts of the Church of England. "God is working outside our traditional structures."

Rachel Jordan, National Adviser for Mission and Evangelism set the conference alight with a vivacious presentation of facts, figures and anecdotes. "We've forgotten how big God is," she said, challenging the conference to recover the confidence

that God can work in the seemingly most unlikely places.

Alongside these contributions were thoughtful Bible Studies on Mark's Gospel by Professor Paul Foster from Edinburgh, witty yet also spiritually profound music and anecdotes from entertainer Jonathan Veira, and a selection of workshops on practical issues such as Messy Church (below) and leading a group Bible study.



The real fruits of the conference will no doubt be seen over the months ahead as ministers translate what they learned into their parish activities. A fuller report and more pictures will appear in Cross Keys in the new year.
