### Letter from Michael Ellard

Dear friends,

As we continue our journey through Advent, with its much-needed message of hope, joy and celebration, it is understandable that some may feel a disconnect between this theme and our world today, increasingly divided through war, conflict, hunger and inequality. We see politicians offering solutions to problems allowed to become acute, in a belief such solutions will win votes, more than bringing a lasting resolution to the matters of concern, whilst in contrast, others work tirelessly to resolve the suffering and inequality that persist.

It was into a world similar to this, that Mary was asked by God to bear his Son. A Son who was to change the perspective of many people's lives, yet, was to be rejected by some then, and with a more secular society today. The Angel Gabriel assures Mary that all will be well, (Luke 1:30), she is not to be afraid, yet, she realises that what God asks of her, to bear a child outside wedlock, would be punishable by death. Her concerns must have been overwhelming, questions would remain – was she being asked to bear this child, with all the consequences it could bring upon her and her family, against losing the love of Joseph, the man she had hoped to marry?

In her acceptance, Mary places the safety of her own life, with that of her unborn child, into the hands of God, through the trust and unfailing love she shows towards him. That trust and love continues to be an example to many today, for it points us to the meaning of 'living life by the Holy Spirit', yet it is a message often lost at this time of the year against the turmoil of the high street.

That love and trust in God is encapsulated in the words of Magnificat, or Mary's Song, (Luke 1:46-55), and through her acceptance, God's Son enters into our world. Yet, as Mary was to discover, it was a world then, like ours today, which, in part, finds it difficult to accept the values Jesus came to bring as being relevant to our modern way of daily living.

A secular society, where 'self-importance' becomes prominent can lead to an ideology that disregards compassion towards others, and fails to address the needs of people in a balanced and understanding way. Through Mary, Jesus grows and develops to point us to a way forward beyond the present, to a time of change that both challenges and changes the world around us. It is a way that shows why

we value each other, and it gives a peace which over-rides our anxieties of the future.

Her part in the Christmas narrative is reflected in the Advent wreaths that decorate our churches the worldwide at this time of the year, yet the importance of her role is not always seen or understood by those who look upon those five candles.

For the moment, we remain on our journey through the Advent story, reflecting on the Patriarchs, Profits and John, the Baptist who we remember this week, as he announces the coming of Jesus. So, as we stand alongside John, looking towards Mary, may we remember these people of great courage as they answered God in response to his call upon them, and know the peace that comes from placing our trust and love in God as they did, a peace that calms our fears of the present and for the future, as it had for Mary
